



WHAT DOES THE IDES OF MARCH MEAN?

The Ides of March is the 74th day in the Roman calendar, which corresponds to March 15 on our calendar.

Romans used the day as the deadline for settling debts, and the day was also marked by several

religious observances.

Each month has an Ides, relating to a <u>full moon</u> as the Roman calendar was lunar based.

The Ides of each month were marked by a sheep sacrifice to Jupiter, the Romans' top god.

On the Ides of March, they held the Feast of Anna Perenna, a goddess whose festival marked the end of the ceremonies for the new year.

Towards the end of the Roman period the Ides also marked the start of a week-long period marking various festivals celebrating Cybele and Attis, two mythical gods.

The Ides of March is just a day in the Roman calendar but it took on much more significance when it became the day <u>Julius Caesar was murdered</u> in 44BC.

Such an infamous event solidified the day in history and became a turning point in Roman culture.

Why an ORGAN in church ?

THE ORGAN IS KNOWN AS THE KING OF INSTRUMENTS

First of all, that's only true in Western Christianity. The Orthodox churches mainly don't allow any instruments but the human voice (which was the way it was in the first Christian churches, too). The organ was developed around 200 years before Christ, but was not used in religious worship – the Byzantines used organs for many purposes, including public entertainment, (There was one in the Hippodrome, a great stadium that hosted things like chariot races.) In 757, Byzantine Emperor Constantine V sent an organ to Pepin the Short, king of the Franks, and Pepin's son Charlemagne liked it so much he requested one for his own chapel, which started the fashion of putting them in churches in Europe.

Different regions of Europe used the organ for worship differently. For example, in southern Europe, organs originally played music during worship but did not accompany the congregation singing, which was a cappella. And only large, rich churches could afford organs, which were (and are today) terribly expensive. Most churches had only a cappella vocal music or used whatever instruments the local congregation had and knew how to play.

In the 19th century, organs became more widespread. Developments in industrial techniques allowed them to be built less expensively, and rising prosperity throughout America and Europe brought pipe organs within the reach of medium-sized churches. And the development of the reed organ (small, quieter, less expensive) and electronic and digital organs made organs possible for churches and private homes. By this time, the trend was set. Organs have waned as far as non-religious use goes, but they have been firmly established in church worship use. **Promise Yourself**
